Why Dogs Engage in Unusual Eating Habits



The good news is we have fixed 35 dogs in March. That is a total of 105 spay/neuters this year.



Volunteering at Hope Ranch is a challenging experience both physically and mentally. It can be disheartening when we realize the magnitude of the ongoing issues in Anza and Aguanga, such as having to spay and neuter 30 dogs from a single property. It can feel like our efforts are not making a significant impact. However, when we think about the two female dogs we were able to spay, we remember that each one could have produced up to 15 puppies, preventing 30 more dogs from being born unwanted. Many times we all go to bed thinking of the dogs that we could not help.
